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INTRODUCTION

Dear Hallows Family,

The word advent literally means 'coming.' The season of Advent is an opportunity for us to consider and to celebrate together the 'comings' of Jesus.

On the one hand, we reflect upon His first coming. We consider how the Old Testament prophets predicted His coming long before He came. We celebrate how He came, why He came, and what His coming means for us.

On the other hand, we also take time to focus our faith upon the promise and inevitability of Jesus' return a second time to finish his work of making all thing new. Jesus came the first time in humility (Philippians 2:8). He came not to be served but to serve and to give His life as a ransom to secure our salvation through his life, death, and resurrection (Mark 10:45). But when he comes again, he promises to return as the conquering King to settle our salvation once and for all. As we reflect upon the two 'comings' of our King, we will find our lives adorned with humility and hope in the here and now.

We designed this year's devotional to include passages intending to demonstrate the power of God's Old Testament promises fulfilled by Christ in the New Testament. This side-by-side comparison is intended to reflect on the reality of the 'comings' of our King and Savior.

When Christians read the Scriptures in light of Advent, we are posturing ourselves in a place of waiting and expectation. We are awaiting the King, but we are not the only people in history to do so! This year's devotional has a new unique element inside. Each day you will see a quoted reflection from an author, pastor, theologian, or poet on the Scripture passage or theme for that day. Our desire is to join other saints in the church, both contemporary and historical, in God's grand redemptive story of the coming King. On the last page, we have compiled a recommended reading list of books we used for these quotations. We hope you enjoy this new addition and find some new favorite authors along the way! For each day leading up to Christmas, you will find discussion questions that we encourage you to reflect on individually, or talk through with a friend or spouse.

Where can the weary look for hope? This is a question that seems to saturate the Scriptures. People living in a fallen world, suppressed by circumstances, long for the relief of suffering and cast their eyes to God for hope. God's people look to Him for the hope of redemption, and God graciously provides. The Scriptures are saturated with weary souls, it is also saturated with the promise of hope. Hope is given by Himself, who will send His one and only Son, to redeem the weary and heavy laden.

This week's theme is hope. Over the next five days, you will read Old Testament passages of hope promised to God's people and New Testament passages of those promises fulfilled in Jesus. The prophets were determined to remind Israel of the coming King, the Messiah, who would save them from sin and suffering, and though we have been shown who that King is, we join with our brothers and sisters of Scripture in our anticipation of the King's second coming. Hope is found in Christ the King; let us be renewed in that wonderful reality.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 30

Old Testament

Isaiah 11:1 Then a shoot will grow from the stump of Jesse, and branch from his roots will bear fruit.

hope fulfilled

New Testament

Revelation 5:4-5 I wept and wept because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or even to look in it. Then one of the elders said to me, "Do not weep. Look, the Lion from the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered so that he is able to open the scroll and its seven seals."

REFLECTIONS ON HOPE

The messages of the prophets and psalmists are whispers which merge into perfect music only when the Son who is in the Father declares the God who has never been seen. All the highways through the centuries lead on towards the city, but the city itself, the city of God, can only be built by the King Himself. From the darkness, through the twilight, men moved towards the perfect light. Through all the ages God followed His perpetual method, line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little.

Through all the centuries He said in effect to men what Christ actually said to His disciples: "I have yet many things to say unto you, but ye cannot bear them now." Thus, quietly and surely, if slowly, God moved on to the final Word, Who was made flesh.

At the heart of the Old Testament may be found the insignificant "What is man?" At the heart of the New is the great exclamation, "Behold the Man!" Yet the Old is of value as it reveals clearly the true principle of human life, the real reason of human sorrow, all the highways that lead towards human redemption.

Ezekiel 34:23 I will establish over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he will shepherd them. He will tend them himself and will be their shepherd.

New Testament

John 10: 11 I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.

REFLECTIONS ON HOPE

Jesus, the Good Shepherd... No picture of Jesus was more dear to the early church. By Jesus the human flock finds pasturage. The grass seems greener beyond the hedge of his care, but that appearance always deceives, for man's self-will leads only to the wastelands.

Our hymnals ring with the praise of Christ, not in any self-hypnotism, but because the generations of those who have loved him have found fulfillment in his shepherding care. He has kindled the mind, enriched the emotions, and nerved the will. By Jesus the human flock has found shelter. Thus he meets life's demand for both adventure and refuge. The yearning for the fold is no cowardice; those who jibe at religion as an "escape" do not choose the beating of the storm when their own door is near at hand.

Pain is only slow death unless interpretation is given, sorrow is only a hopelessness unless some rainbow is flung across it, and sin is a worse despair unless there is assurance of pardon. Jesus leads the flock out of the storm of sorrow, and sin, and guides it into his fold.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 2

Old Testament

Zechariah 3:8-9 Listen, High Priest Joshua, you and your colleagues sitting before you; indeed, these men are a sign that I am about to bring my servant, the Branch... and I will take away the iniquity of this land in a single day.

hope fulfilled

New Testament

Hebrews 7:26-27 For this is the kind of high priest we need: holy, innocent, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. He doesn't need to offer sacrifices every day, as high priests do — first for their own sins, then for those of the people. He did this once for all time when he offered himself.

REFLECTIONS ON HOPE

It took a great many days to pile up the sin, but one day sees it removed. Throughout the hundreds of years of the judges, the kings, the captivities, and so on, they continued to revolt of the divine authority, they heaped up transgression till it stood aloft in mountainous height, and yet when the dreadful pile was completed the Lord made it to disappear in one day.

Yes, and our sins have taken a long time to heap up, they comprise the sins of our youth, the sins of our adulthood, the transgressions of our riper years and it may be we have added to these the sins of our old age. One may say as he looks at his sin, "That is forty years' work." Another may mournfully confess "that is seventy years' accumulation." If each sin deserves a tear, O to be a Niobe¹; for we have need that clouds and rains dwell in our eyes, our souls have need of all the watery things nature can produce.

But we may dry our tears, for though many days were taken for the formation of the sin, the Lord saith He will remove it all in one day. In one single day seventy years of sin are forever put away by our Lord Jesus; truly for this His name shall be called "Wonderful."

Micah 5:2-3 Bethlehem Ephrathah, you are small among the clans of Judah; one will come from you to be ruler over Israel for me. His origin is from antiquity, from ancient times. Therefore, Israel will be abandoned until the time when she who is in labor has given birth.

hope fulfilled

New Testament

Matthew 2:1-2 After Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of King Herod, wise men from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star at its rising and have come to worship him."

REFLECTIONS ON HOPE

He who existed as the Son of God before all ages, without a beginning, deigned to become the Son of Man in these recent years. He did this although He who submitted to such great evils for our sake had done no evil and although we, who were the recipients of so much good at His hands, had done nothing to merit these benefits. Begotten by the Father, He was not made by the Father; He was made Man in the Mother whom He Himself had made, so that He might exist here for a while, sprung from her who could never and nowhere have existed except through His power.

Luke 1:68-69, 76-77 Blessed is the Lord, the God of Israel, because he has visited and provided redemption for his people. He has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David... and you, child, will be called a prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways.

REFLECTIONS ON HOPE

peace

What is peace? We pray for it often. It has a universal hand signal. It's used as a greeting in churches and a goodbye for us 90's kids. Also, if we learned anything from "Miss Congeniality," it's that the correct answer to the question "What is the most important thing our society needs?" is world peace. So, what is it? In the gospel of Mark chapter 4, we see an interesting and challenging definition of this term. A storm is bombarding the boat the disciples and Jesus are in, and the disciples, understandably, start to fear. Meanwhile, Jesus has found a cozy place to rest his head. The disciples awaken Jesus, and ask Him if He would be interested in drowning. Jesus politely declined by speaking into the storm and causing it to cease. Ah, there it is, peace. The storm finally being calmed. However, Jesus then asks the disciples why they were afraid, did they not have faith? And therein lies the true meaning of peace. Jesus seems to tie peace into having faith. Jesus knew that his Father's purpose would be fulfilled and in that promise He rested, even in the middle of a storm. So, what peace has been extended to us? That same purpose Jesus rested in, His sacrifice for us. The whole world is looking for peace and yet it was delivered as a promise and an infant in a manger in Bethlehem 2,000 years ago.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 7

Old Testament

Ezekiel 37:26-27 I will make a covenant of peace with them; it will be a permanent covenant with them. I will establish and multiply them and will set my sanctuary among them forever. My dwelling place will be with them; I will be their God, and they will be my people.

peace fulfilled

New Testament

Matthew 26:27-29 Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks, he gave it to them and said, "Drink from it, all of you. For this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. But I tell you, I will not drink from this fruit of the vine from now on until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom."

REFLECTIONS ON PEACE

Jesus is a Redeemer, that is his name; he came into the world on this very business, to redeem his people, to redeem them from all iniquity (Titus 2:14), from this present evil world, from our vain conversations. He hath shed his precious blood to purchase us, we are bought with a price (1 Corinthians 6:20). We are none of our own, we are his, the purchase of his blood; and we may be confident that he dearly loves us, for he dearly bought us; and if he had not dearly loved us, he would never have given himself for us (Galatians 2:20). That was the highest testimony of his love; he loves us, and washed us from our sins in his blood (Revelation 1:5). He will redeem us from the wrath to come.

Old Testament

Isaiah 53:5-6

But he was pierced because of our rebellion, crushed because of our iniquities; punishment for our peace was on him, and we are healed by his wounds.

We all went astray like sheep; we all have turned to our own way; and the LORD has punished him for the iniquity of us all.

peace f<u>ulfilled</u>

New Testament

1 Peter 2:24-25 He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree; so that, having died to sins, we might live for righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. For you were like sheep going astray, but you have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls.

REFLECTIONS ON PEACE

Why was it necessary for Christ, the Redeemer, to die? This is a heavy question. I don't know if questions get much heavier than this. Christ lived a perfect life, the life you and I should have lived. He lived a life of love, of service. He lived an amazing life of trust in his heavenly Father. So the question is a pressing one. Why should one like that die? Why was it morally necessary?

Well, he didn't have to die for his own sake. If we were thinking just about Jesus, there would be no necessity for the cross. No, he died because he would be the Redeemer. It was his will, and also his heavenly Father's will, to redeem us. It was his will to lay down his life, to sacrifice himself by dying on the cross in order to rescue us from the penalty that we deserved. You see, because God is good, he will punish sin. That wrong thing that you or I have done in secret—God knows about it. God's real. He's not just an idea. He's not just a figment of our imagination. And this God is so thoroughly committed to what is good and right that every sin will be punished. And this is where Jesus comes in.

Jesus determined to be our Redeemer. It was the will of his heavenly Father that he would give himself as a sacrifice in substitution. That's the word that's often used—as a substitute, in the place of, instead of you and me. Jesus is our substitute if we repent of our sins, turn from them and trust in him.

So why did the Redeemer need to die? Because that's the only way you and I would live.

Old Testament

Isaiah 57:19 The Lord says, "Peace, peace to the one who is far or near, and I will heal him."

peace fulfilled

New Testament

Ephesians 2:17-20 He came and proclaimed the good news of peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. For through him we both have access in one spirit to the Father. So, then, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with the saints, and members of God's household, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone.

REFLECTIONS ON PEACE

Jesus is the embodiment of who God is. He is the tangible epitomization of God. Jesus Christ is the visible manifestation of the invisible God (2 Cor. 4:4-6). In him we see heaven's eternal heart walking around on two legs in time and space. When we see the heart of Christ, then, throughout the four Gospels, we are seeing the very compassion and tenderness of who God himself most deeply is.

As you consider the Father's heart for you, remember that he is the Father of mercies. He is not cautious in his tenderness toward you. He multiplies mercies matched to your every need, and there is nothing he would rather do. "Remember," said the Puritan John Flavel, "that this God in whose hand are all creatures, is your Father, and is much more tender of you than you are, or can be, of yourself." Your gentlest treatment of yourself is less gentle than the way your heavenly Father handles you. His tenderness toward you outstrips what you are even capable of toward yourself. The heart of Christ is gentle and lowly. And that is the perfect picture of who the Father is.

Jeremiah 33:6 Yet I will certainly bring health and healing to it and will indeed heal them. I will let them experience the abundance of true peace.

peace fulfilled

New Testament

Romans 5:1-2 Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. We have also obtained access through him by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we boast in the hope of the glory of God.

REFLECTIONS ON PEACE

We must realize that Christianity is the easiest religion in the world, because it is the only religion in which God the Father and Christ and the Holy Spirit do everything. God is the Creator; we have nothing to do with our existence, or the existence of other things. We can shape other things, but we cannot change the fact of existence. We do nothing for our salvation because Christ did it all. We do not have to do anything.

In every other religion we have to do something... but with Christianity we do not do anything; God has done it all: He has created us and He has sent His Son; His Son died and because the Son is infinite, therefore he bears our total guilt. We do not need to bear our own guilt, nor do we even have to merit the merit of Christ. He does it all. So in one way it is the easiest religion in the world.

Joy is a constant theme in scripture. From Genesis through Revelation we see this tiny three letter word. Most often it is presented in a cause and effect type scenario. The interesting thing is it seems to be one of those strange transitive property type things. You remember the transitive property from algebra right? If A=B and B=C then A=C? Now, I (Stephen) got a solid "C" in College Algebra—the last math class I will ever take—so I'm more than qualified to explain this to you.

In the Bible, when good things happen we have joy. When trials come we are commanded to count it as joy. When we receive blessings we have joy, but also in loss and sadness we can find joy. In fact, in 1 Thessalonians 5:16 Paul gives a big directive to the people when he says, "Rejoice always!" Maybe everything just equals rejoicing. In good times, rejoice. In sadness, rejoice. In a pandemic, rejoice. At the birth of a child, rejoice. Scripture seems to tell us rejoicing isn't just an effect of joy it is also a cause for joy. Rejoice whether we feel it or not for the King has come and is coming again. In that rejoicing we find joy, both the feeling and the man (refer back to the transitive property thing).

Our last week of Advent is centered on the theme of love. As we have seen thus far, it is God's love for us that compels Him to send His Son to be the Savior of the world. Jesus was born in complete humility as his earthly parents had nothing to provide Him but simple love and adoration. Isn't that the beauty of Advent-Jesus coming to us when we have nothing to give?

The great mystery of fallen humanity, after all, is that this is exactly how God planned it to be. Advent is love coming as our Savior and demonstrating God's perfect character. As Pastor Dane Ortlund says, "The Jesus given to us in the Gospels is not simply one who loves, but one who is love; merciful affections stream from his innermost heart as rays from the sun."

As you read and reflect on this week's passages, we pray you will be struck in awe of God's love for you in His Son. The God of the universe sent His Son to be our Savior, and in our fickleness and simple gratitude, we love Him for it.

In the Incarnation, God the Son takes the body and human soul of Jesus, and, through that, the whole environment of Nature, all the creaturely predicament, into His own being. So that 'He came down from Heaven' can almost be transposed into 'Heaven drew up into it', and locality, limitation, sleep, sweat, footsore weariness, frustration, pain, doubt, and death, are, from before all worlds, known by God from within. The pure light walks the earth; the darkness, received into the heart of Deity, is there swallowed up. Where, except in the uncreated light, can the darkness be drowned?
